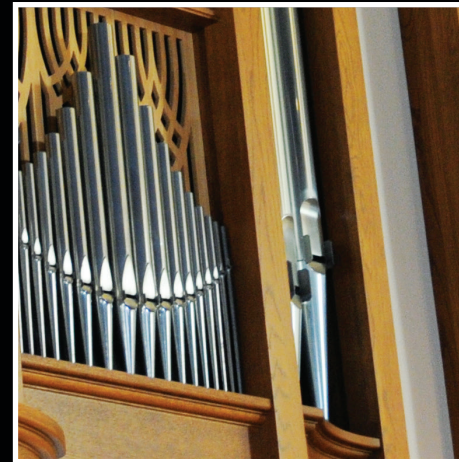
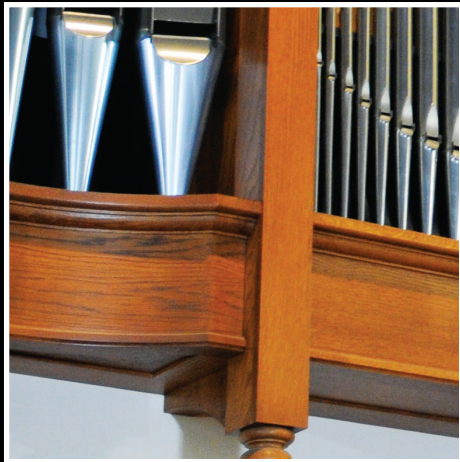

He is also the director of cathedral music and organist at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, Kent Tritel is the organist for the New York Philharmonic and the American Symphony Orchestra, and a member of the faculty of the Manhattan School of Music and the graduate faculty of the Juilliard School. Musica Sacra of Sarasota is the Florida Gulf Coast's only concert ensemble dedicated to the performances and promotion of choral/orchestral music based on sacred texts. Mozart's last major choral work, left incomplete at the time of his death is presented in the manner it would have been performed. Mozart received a commission from Count von Walsegg, who wanted a requiem composed for his wife. At Mozart's death, only the Introitus and the Kyrie of the Requiem were fully scored, and the other movements were only sketched. Franz Xaver Süssmayr completed the Requiem.

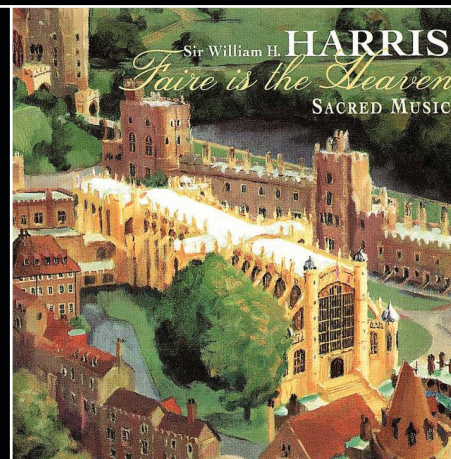

The men of the Church of the Redeemer Choir will sing the choral parts to the Alto Rhapsody by Johannes Brahms, featuring Thea Lobo as the contralto soloist. The Alto Rhapsody, opus 53, is a setting of verses from Johann Wolfgang von Goethe's *Harzreise im Winter*. The text, is a portrayal of a suffering soul who is urged to find spiritual sustenance and throw off the shackles of his suffering. It was written in 1869, as a wedding gift for Robert and Clara Schumann's daughter, Julie. Brahms scholars have long suspected that the composer may have had romantic feelings for Julie, which he may have integrated into the text and the music. Thea Lobo, this year has relocated to Sarasota from Boston, Massachusetts. At Church of the Redeemer, she is an Alto section leader. Ms. Lobo is married to Sam Nelson, the assistant-organist choirmaster at Church of the Redeemer. Thea's professional career takes her to national and international musical events.

The choirs of Church of the Redeemer will offer the glorious double choir motet "*Faire is the heaven*" by William Henry Harris KCVO (Knight Commander of the Royal Victorian Order, British honor) as the anthem for Choral Evensong. *The Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis in a minor* by T. Tertius Noble. Sir William Henry Harris, an English organist and composer is best remembered for two Anglican Anthems, *Faire is the heaven and Hymn of heavenly beauty*. Sir Harris held the prestigious positions as organist New College in 1919, and in 1929 Christ Church Oxford, moving to St. George's Chapel, Windsor in 1933. As Organist and Choirmaster at Windsor, Harris was at his most productive. He produced music for the Three Choir's Festival, was a conductor at both the 1937 and 1953 coronations, and had music premiered at the Proms, all of which led to being appointed KCVO in 1954.

Sir Hubert Parry composed some of the most masterful and moving choral music of the Victorian and Edwardian eras. His magnificent coronation anthem for Edward VII, *I was glad*, and his *Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis* known as the Great Service, display his debt and gratitude to Anglican musical traditions. The Great Service has slow, unwinding themes and memorable stirring melodies. Parry was born in Bournemouth in 1848. He was the second son of Thomas Parry, of Highnam Court, Gloucester – an amateur artist. His grandfather was a director of the East India Company. He was a member of a well-known naval family. The beginning of his career was with Lloyds of London. He worked the job for four years when the business suddenly failed. This failure allowed him to abandon the business for a career in music. Following this he soon became a Doctor of Music at Cambridge in 1883. In 1884 Parry succeeded in being appointed to the position of Choragus at Oxford at the same time being admitted to Oxford as Doctor of Music ad eundem in 1884.

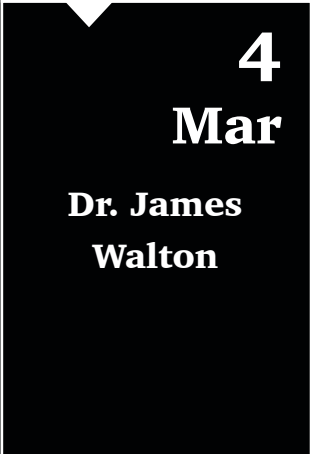

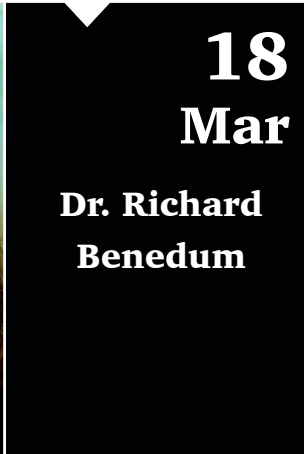

## Cameron Carpenter

An extraordinary organist is leaving his mark on recent music history. One of the most in-demand Organists in the world. Recent recitals with the Los Angeles Philharmonic, the Lucerne Festival, Philharmonie Cologne, Festspielhaus Baden-Baden, Philharmonie Luxembourg and his debut at the Cité de la musique, in Paris. Cameron Carpenter became the first organist to ever be nominated for a Grammy Award for his solo album, *Revolutionary*. He designed and commissioned the International Touring Organ, a one-of-a-kind, customized, “full scale portable organ sonically tailorable to any acoustic environment”, which took ten years and cost \$2 million to build. Although Carpenter will be playing the million dollar Nichols and Simpson organ at the Church of the Redeemer, the story of the International Touring Organ is fascinating. Since the premier of the ITO in March 2014, Cameron no longer has to learn a new instrument for every performance which he characterized as maddening. He now tours worldwide to venues that have never had an organ. The story of the ITO – International Touring Organ is the subject of the 2015 documentary “the Sound of My Life”.
